Purposes of cleaning operations

To remove substances and materials from the surface of the mosaic that could be responsible for its deterioration.

To enable a better assessment of the mosaic's condition by making its surface more visible.

To prepare the mosaic for mortar-based stabilization treatments.








Removal of accumulated sand and soil with a brush




Removal of accumulated soil in the interstices between tesserae with a dental pick




Removal of modern repair mortars with a chisel and small hammer




Removal of soil and vegetation with seissors








Removal of micro-organisms with a small brush




Area of mosaic after removal of micro-organisms


